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

### **Introduction to the Special Edition**

### **Nursing Education and Patient Care Research**

In this special section, five papers highlight the global changes taking place in health professional education specifically in nursing. These changes are described in the context of new research findings, reports by national healthcare organizations and the need for new competencies of health care professionals. There is international agreement that the future of health care education must incorporate knowledge and skills related to interprofessional collaboration. What is not as clear is how health care educators can best teach new knowledge and skills to students learning not only what is in the textbooks but also how to work within teams of health care professionals under stressful conditions.

Using students as subjects helps us understand their perspectives related to seeking balance and managing their external lives and educational expectations without the need to leave the profession at a time when more nurses are needed globally. These papers show that the nursing profession will continue to be challenged with an ever growing set of changes and practice demands. Nurse educators have the difficult task of looking into the future to educate students for both today and tomorrow and expand their own interpersonal and teaching skills to ensure that both the classroom and clinical settings are conducive to a positive learning experience and student support. Recommendations for further research point the way for others to extend these five studies to answer the complex and difficult questions posed by the researchers.

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
